

The cycle launches each summer. With one season just completed and another's on the calendar, the work to plan and make the following season's sausage begins. Approximately 15 months before the first note is played, we begin making fresh plans.

The active and engaged chamber music committee meets to discuss ensembles of interest, those they've heard, or have heard about. There's a lengthy list of "wants" carried over from season to season additions are made - some are crossed off. With guidance from the committee, I begin making calls and sending

emails to the managers and agents in the vast network of contacts we maintain. The goal is to create a balanced season of ensembles and repertoire, established and emerging artists, within our budget and technical capabilities, and on the spread of targeted dates we've identified. Piece of cake. Sausage.

I start with international ensembles as those tend to have limited availability in North America each season. Quickly we learn which ensembles are touring when and which MAY be able to get up to Orono on their North American tour, on a date that may work for us. If necessary, I gingerly suggest the manager look at a map.

Apologies in advance for the food Over the next several months, punctuated by phone calls and emails, we prioritize two to three international ensembles, and I'll begin negotiations. The artist fee, hotel, travel, calendar, and technical requirements are all discussed before landing on an offer we feel comfortable with. If the principals involved appear new to the process, I quiz the managers and ensembles to be

sure they understand the visa requirements and tax implications of playing in the US. With our international ensembles confirmed, we'll start on the US ensembles under consideration and eventually land on a series we hope is varied, exciting, thoughtful and thoughtprovoking. Along the way I brief and consult the

Executive Director and the committee members on our progress and try to answer any concerns or questions.

This planning process can take six months or more, with further time to settle repertoire to ensure we're not repeating, for example, a particular Beethoven quartet. It really does take a team to make these plans; the committee, the CCA staff, the managers and agents and, of course, the ensembles we ultimately present in Orono. We're working together, in concert, to cook up a season of memorable chamber music.
